Students Awarded Scholarships for IT Competition

Bismarck, N.D. – Three North Dakota students were awarded scholarships for their achievements in information technology (IT) competitions at the state SkillsUSA competition held April 27. The scholarships were sponsored by the Information Technology Council of North Dakota (ITCND).

Scholarship recipients were Jeremy Bateman, Minot Public School in the computer maintenance technology division; Jake Collings, Grand Forks Red River High School in the computer programming division; and Alex Holweger, Grand Forks Central High School in the internetworking division.

Each recipient received a \$1,000 scholarship to be used at a North Dakota postsecondary institution of their choice. They also received \$500 toward travel to the national SkillsUSA competition June 21-27 in Kansas City.

“The IT industry has made it a priority to get students interested in IT careers. These students have shown the interest and scholarships are one way to keep them engaged,” says ITCND President Gary Inman of Echelon Corporation in Fargo. “There currently are and will continue to be high-quality, high-wage IT job opportunities for them in North Dakota.”

ITCND sponsored the scholarships as part of its IT Career Awareness Program. The goal of the program is to inform students, parents and educators of the state’s IT career opportunities in an effort to secure an IT workforce into the future. A recent study reports North Dakota’s IT industry will have 2,500 (1,200 new and 1,300 replacement) open positions over the next decade. This equals one-third of the current IT industry workforce of 7,500.

These numbers reflect the workforce needed only in the core IT industries of computer systems design, software publishing and data processing and hosting. These areas represent only 10 percent of the state’s total IT workers. Not taken into account are the 90 percent of IT workers employed in the state’s other top industries including agriculture, health care, energy, manufacturing and financial services.

“IT is an integral component of virtually every sector and industry statewide. This magnifies the need for a high-quality IT workforce,” says Inman.
